

MES CAIRO FAMILY HER-STORY

One of my earliest memories as a child was being taken to my maternal grandmother Rabiha Mikdadi's school in Kuwait (Jeel Al Jadeed) to watch their school productions. It was the first private all-girls' school established in Kuwait and the best school in the country. Its students achieved the highest Thanaweya Ama (Tawjeehey) scores for over two decades.

I remember being encouraged by my great aunt, Fadila Abou Dheir, who was the Primary Principal at the time, to join in the festivities. They would dress me up in costume and I would just join in the fun of it all. I was so taken by









the magic of music and the moment, that I now attribute my love for the performing arts to that early exposure.

Over the years, I would spend a great deal of time in that school, doing my homework in the afternoon in my mom's office who was the Middle School and High School Principal or watch her as she spoke in the morning assembly as the girls all around me whispered about her elegant attire and formidable presence. I was so proud of my family and so in awe of their ability to manage this humongous educational establishment (3000 students) while still being my Tata, my Khalti and my Mama.


Growing up, I would watch how my Mama would work 16-hour days establishing one of the largest educational institutions in the Middle East, encompassing schools, educational centres and training colleges, and still have the energy to be the best mother. When it was my turn to choose my path in life, my father allowed me the freedom to research and explore. He finally asked me: "With a family like yours, wouldn't it be a shame not to continue the path established two generations ago? In years to come, what would you envision would be your legacy?". That was a turning point in my life, and from there my educational and professional choices were made.

Over the years, the heritage my family founded in education branched out and thrived. Today, my maternal aunt, Salwa Mikdadi, is a renowned Art Curator and Professor of Art History at NYUAD. My maternal cousins, Dr Mostafa, Dr Nawal and Dr Salwa Ammar, are professors and deans of colleges in the US. There are many more academics in my paternal and extended family and among the younger cousins who are teachers and professors in Jordan, Egypt and all over the world.

Family is the theme of this MESsenger. Cherishing family is the foremost objective of our professional and personal lives. In my family, the conviction that life and diaspora will take you everywhere and present you with surprises and throw at you the strongest of challenges, is a conviction that began generations ago. Education is your best tool, your greatest gift to yourself and your strongest suit of armour with which to face the world. It shapes your mind, your character and prepares you to stand up for yourself while accepting that your circumstances will inevitably always change.

School Director Foreword

Reflecting on the first term of this academic year I think that we should all take enormous pride in what we have achieved. We welcomed all students back to campus in mid-September, ensuring that policies, practices and protocols were in place to support their safe return. Whilst our community has been directly affected by Coronavirus, there is evidence to confirm that our safety precautions of wearing masks, sanitising hands and maintaining social distance wherever possible, is reducing the risk of transmission on campus, along with conservative measures when a student and/or their household, tests positive for the virus. We sincerely thank our parent community for their continuing support of our efforts; successfully managing our school amidst the pandemic has proven time and time again the importance of school/home collaboration.



We had identified some inevitable gaps in curriculum coverage which arose as the result of disrupted learning last year. Whilst those gaps were small, thanks to the extensive efforts by all to ensure quality teaching and learning under the most challenging of circumstances, knowing what and where they are means that we have been able to focus on recovery. Students continue to make great progress under the carefully considered direction of their teachers.

Despite the tumultuous times we face, we made a determined commitment this term to ensure that the school experience for our students has been as normal as it can be, not only where learning is concerned, but in our clearly articulated and uncompromising expectations of positive school culture and learning behaviour. We have overcome challenges as a community and again, appreciate parents' positive support in embracing the high standards we uphold at our school.

We have even had capacity to take a few carefully considered risks in order to bring life to the curriculum and learning experiences of our students, hosting special events and trips where we felt it was safe to do so. In this publication we celebrate these memories and how we as a school community are working together, to bring some normalcy back into the lives of our youth.

Offering an ASA programme of opportunities that focused on physical activity and health has been sustained through Term 1, our younger students have been off-campus to visit Arty Farm, our Pioneers have navigated an orienteering exercise at the Giza plateau. In addition, our National Honor Society prepared for and led teacher tours at the Museum of Culture and Antiquities. We hosted a virtual conference for 300 IB educators, and professional development sessions with one of the world's foremost researchers on assessment and pedagogy, Professor Dylan Wiliam. We have also celebrated students' capabilities in the arts with virtual productions, news broadcasts and choral concerts. We have coordinated the collection of donations for the Egyptian Foodbank via our Keep Egypt Warm campaign, collaborated an Operation Patchwork event to cover the school field with blanket donations for the Egyptian Clothing Bank, and we have fundraised for the Breast Cancer Foundation of Egypt. All this was achieved amidst a pandemic, and following a year of uncertain reality. We have achieved a great deal, and most notably, have delivered quality education to all students on campus throughout the term.

Now we set our sights on what we can achieve in Term 2 and through the remainder of this academic year.

And we achieve all that we do because we work together. The concept of 'family' underscores every aspect of our school and has done so ever since MES Cairo came to being in 1990. Family remains at the very core of our ethos and is celebrated in a myriad of different ways each and every day. This edition of our MESsenger highlights the importance of family, ours and yours. When family work together we can overcome the greatest of challenges and achieve whatever we set our sights on.

IBDP students at MES Cairo celebrated their success this summer. With 22 graduates headed to universities in the autumn to attend universities such as University of British Columbia and Memorial University of Newfoundland in Canada, University of Twenty in the Netherlands, University of Illinois and Michigan State University in the USA and King's College London and Leeds University in the UK.

All our IBDP graduates achieved over 24 points and received the IB Diploma. Our two top scoring students, Maya Emam and Salma Garana, were awarded 39 and 38 points, respectively which is over 225 UCAS points each and equates to more than four A* A-Level grades each.

MES Cairo has been offering the International Baccalaureate's IB Diploma Programme since 2006. Our IB students, through their experiences in the programme, develop critical thinking skills, communication skills, study skills and an enhanced ability to adapt and contribute to university life and beyond.

Olli-Pekka Heinonen, Director General of the International Baccalaureate, said:

"The last 18 months have been incredibly challenging for students, teachers, and schools throughout the world as COVID-19 has undermined much of what we had come to take for granted. I salute their spirit and dedication to our shared mission: education for a better world.

A key responsibility of the IB this year has been to ensure that our students are not disadvantaged by the pandemic, including in their applications to university and higher education. The many changes we have made to this session are part of this commitment to ensure students are not affected by the hugely challenging circumstances in which they have been learning.

We understand the pressure being put on the whole education system by COVID-19, and we thank all our partners, including universities, for their support and understanding as we have navigated our way through this challenging time."

By developing the attributes and skills needed for success, in addition to a breadth of experience and knowledge, the IB Diploma Programme ideally prepares students for their studies at university, developing their careers and managing the challenges of an international and connected world. Those who have achieved their IB Diploma should feel confident that they are already a step ahead.

Every year students from the American Section take Advanced Placement courses at MES Cairo. All High School students have the opportunity to choose from 16 rigorous college-level courses in English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Art and Technology. In May, students take an exam to assess their knowledge. The results are reported on a scale of 1-5 with 5 representing a student who is extremely well qualified in their knowledge of the subject.

The College Board reviews the results of all current and previous exams at the conclusion of each testing year. Outstanding students receive awards in three categories - AP Scholar, AP Scholar with Honor, AP Scholar with Distinction.

- AP Scholar Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.
- AP Scholar with Honor Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores . of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.
- AP Scholar with Distinction Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

In May 2021, 61 students from the American Section took 100 exams to assess their knowledge in fifteen different subjects. Twelve of these students received recognition from the College Board for their amazing AP results! Their average AP score was 3.7. Of the twelve students, MES Cairo had seven AP Scholars, one AP Scholar with Honor and four AP Scholars with Distinction.

All profits made from the sale of the Pink Day 2021 pack were donated in full to the Breast Cancer Foundation of Egypt on behalf of the MES Cairo community.



Dylan Willam Training Sessions for MES Cairo Teachers



MES Cairo teachers recently engaged in a series of stimulating online Professional Development sessions led by Professor Dylan Wiliam. Dylan Ap Rhys Wiliam is a British educationalist and Emeritus professor of Educational Assessment at the UCL institute of Education. He lives in Florida, USA. His life work has focused on the professional development of teachers and on formative assessment to support student learning. Formative assessment refers to a variety of methods that teachers use to evaluate students' learning. His book, *Inside the Black Box* which he wrote with Paul Black in 1998, is a best seller. He further expands on these ideas in his 2011 book, *Embedded Formative Assessment*, which describes five key strategies of effective formative assessment in the classroom.

He was an advisor to British Prime Minister Tony Blair from 2000-2007.

Teachers from Primary and Secondary tuned in to Dylan's sessions on four occasions after school. We gathered in small groups where possible and enjoyed follow-up discussions after each session. Indeed, the sessions were so stimulating that our teachers are still talking about them now. Where it enhances practice, teachers are incorporating Dylan Wiliam's methods into their daily work and we are seeing some great benefits.

Each session was focussed on a different theme:

- Embedding Formative Assessment
- How do we prepare young people for a world we cannot imagine?
- Cognitive load theory
- Learning and memory

Most of what our students need to know hasn't been discovered or invonted yot. 'Learning how to learn' used to be an optional extra in education; today, it's a survival skill. -Dylan William

We asked our teachers what they thought of Dylan Wiliam's sessions and here is what they told us!

Our first online PD session did not disappoint - Dylan is a master at communicating complex and diverse concepts in a manner which allows teachers to implement practical strategies in the classroom with immediate effect.

Prof Dylan Wiliam reminded us that we must never extinguish a child's passion for learning; most of what they will need to know to be successful adults has not been discovered yet.

What a privilege to spend the afternoon in the company of such an iconic educator, researcher and inspiration, talking about our core purpose. I will teach my classes with a renewed sense of purpose and importance tomorrow.

Technology does not replace people because we all seek human interaction. Rather it alters and transforms previously conceived positions into something quite different. Creativity counts so don't be afraid to breathe that into the curriculum that you teach.

A delight to listen and reflect on Dylan Wiliam's webinars. A rare academic who is able to interpret and explain educational research clearly and inspire you to ignite the passion in students to learn.



What is your greatest extracurricular achievement?



Their well-researched presentations concentrated on the scientific explanation behind their products. We had a

Our Science Topic this term linked to Living Things and our central statement was: Human Action Impacts the Natural World. In English, we researched and wrote explanation texts about endangered and extinct animals. In Guided Reading, the students learned about the invaluable work of the Blue Iguana Recovery Program in the Cayman Islands. The students in Y4O were delighted to find out that their artwork is to be shared with The National Trust in The Cayman Islands. In Art, we created papier-mâché animals and focussed on sketching skills. In Science, we explored animal classification and food chains and the students were given the opportunity to prepare an extended project at home which linked with our learning at school. We received a number of excellent, indepth presentations in the form of display boards, posters and videos. We were particularly proud of a group of students who caught our attention in Y4R. They decided to find a variety of ways to raise money to adopt their own endangered animal. By selling seashells and setting up lemonade stalls, the students planned, worked hard and eventually achieved their goal: to adopt an Amur leopard via the World Wildlife Foundation.














NO MORE CONFUSION ABOUT HOW GOOD MODERN ENGLISH SCHOOL CAIRO'S WRITING ISI

At Modern English School Cairo, we are always finding ways to perform on the world stage as we know our students are good enough! This is why, when we found out about a new writing assessment tool, we were eager to get involved and show just how good our written work is.

'No More Marking' is an assessment tool which is designed to make it easy to judge and assess the writing of our students. Taking part in six assessment windows over the year, one per Year group, our staff, alongside those from other schools around the world, will get to judge the writing of our students, comparing it with others. Many judgments allow the 'No More Marking' team to give us results which are reliable, accurate and give us scores, a writing age, and a grade.

Year 3 students were the first year group to be chosen to take part in this session. Taking place in late October, the teachers and students received an image of an aliens in space scene as our writing prompt. The students in all six classes then had to write a story based on the image they could see. Were the aliens heading to earth? Were they returning? Why did they look so happy? Was something good or bad about to happen? The students were not allowed help during the writing task; they had to draw on their knowledge of previous English lessons with their teachers and try to include all the exciting vocabulary, grammar rules and spellings they had been learning. It was a chance for our students to show off all they had learnt!

The writing was completed on special scripts that could easily be scanned into our printers and uploaded on the 'No More Marking' website quickly. It was exciting to see the number of students who were taking part in this task - 45,000 students from 1000 schools with more than 10,000 judges ready to look at pieces of writing from all corners of the world!

Once all of the scripts from other schools had been uploaded onto the website the Year 3 teachers and TLAs alongside Mr Dave, Miss Bennett, Miss Barbara, Miss Carol, Miss Deena and Miss Kerry sat together after school to judge. Judging was simple; the website chose the scripts that we would judge from our school and from other schools around the world. We then had a simple choice to make - which script out of the left and the right was better? This continued throughout the session until we had made over 100 judgements per teacher and TLA! All the time, the website would tell us how accurate we were and if we were agreeing with one another - MES Cairo teachers and TLAs were 10% more accurate than they needed to be to get our judgements accepted and counted by the website.

Once the judging was completed, we also had time at the end of the session to discuss what the writing we saw was like. What were we doing great at? What did we need to improve upon in the written work we saw? This has allowed our teachers to plan for sessions that can focus on the areas of the curriculum that the students found more challenging which showed how useful the session was.

We are now eagerly awaiting our results and looking forward to the next 'No More Marking' writing session with Year 5. We hope that this will continue to improve our writing results over the coming years and prove to us what we already know that students at Modern English School Cairo, are fantastic writers!

Year 1

From History and Geography to Global perspectives and Psychology, the Humanities offer students the chance to understand and appreciate the world around them. They are taught to view things through different lenses and critique and question what they think they already know.

In Humanities, students will learn about time, places, cultures and events around the world. They are encouraged to question, debate, offer alternative explanations and make inferences about the way things work and the way things are done. Students are exposed to new academic vocabulary on a daily basis, with students learning new 'BUZZ words' to help them construct analysis, in-depth critiques and arguments.

YEAR 7



Year 7 students have dived right in to 'What is History?' and have been learning valuable map reading skills in Geography. The key element of the KS3 courses are the learning and development of key skills in each subject. From chronology, inferring and analysing sources in history to learning about continents, oceans, grid referencing and explaining direction in Geography. Students are now moving into Ancient Civilisations in History and Glaciation and climate change in Geography- very appropriate considering the COP26 currently taking place in the UK.

YEAR 8

Year 8 students have been working on a unit on population in Geography, analysing the Syrian refugee crisis and developing essay writing skills. Meanwhile, in History, the causes, effects and consequences of WW1 and WW2 have been thoroughly explored and examined.

KEY STAGE 4 AND 5



KS4 and KS5 have made great strides in their learning in preparation for their exams. Students are learning valuable transferable skills that will be of benefit in a wide range of career paths. Skills including research, evaluation, analysis, ICT and communication are all developed when taking a humanities-based subject.

At KS5, students can take Psychology in the IBDP, or as an A Level. Psychology is the scientific study of the mind and human behaviour. Students are introduced to the subject through a core unit on research methods. In order to understand how humans behave, we need to design ways of scientifically studying it. A range of teaching and learning strategies are used to ensure lessons are creative, dynamic, interesting and most importantly fun!

The Humanities team are excited for what we can accomplish together this year. We cannot wait to take you on an exciting journey through history and the world around us. If you have

The United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) was founded in 1996 with the aim of advancing the education of young people. The UKMT Individual Mathematics Challenges are intriguing multiple-choice question papers designed to stimulate interest in mathematics. The Junior Challenge attracts over 300 000 entries each year and is the United Kingdom's most popular mathematics competition. The competition is also open to international schools that offer a properly accredited British education.

The papers contain 25 multiple choice questions. Of these, the first 15 are more accessible whilst the final 10 provide more food for thought. Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates are awarded to only 40% of participants.

This year, the Junior Challenge was sat online, and a number of MES Cairo students were selected to take part. Some of those students had been preparing since the beginning of the year through the Mathematical Challenge Google Classroom.

TAKE A LOOK AT WHAT IS HAPPENING IN YEARS 11 AND 12

It has been very exciting to have students back on campus continuing to work through the 'Plan for Grad' framework which has been implemented through the HRCF curriculum. This framework runs throughout the school. Students have worked on developing their CVs and discovering how aspects of their personality may make them suited for particular careers. Coupled with exploring potential Universities and courses the students have appreciated the opportunity to learn about how the different university systems can lead to different career pathways alongside the ever-expanding range of jobs which are predicted to be highly sought after in the future.

Year 12 students have been concentrating on writing their personal statements for their university applications. They have also had the opportunity of attending a number of virtual university fairs which provided the opportunity for pertinent questions, relevant to future plans, to be answered by the university admissions teams. Universities we have hosted include a number from the UK including Imperial, Bath, Bristol, Durham, St. Andrew's and Surrey. We have also hosted Queen's in Canada, Leiden in the Netherlands, Bocconi in Italy and Loyola Marymount in the USA. The admissions team at Oxford also contributed to a seminar which was held during the fair.

Recognising the demands of examinations, there is a specific HRCF focus on fostering critical thinking skills and practical strategies including a bespoke exam mind-set coaching element. All of this encourages the holistic development of each learner and the skills expected of 21st century graduates as published by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD). MES Cairo continues to be a highly successful school, testament to the work of our students and a culmination of the commitment they display towards their studies along with a willingness to embrace new ideas.

A wealth of research-based activities linking learning to real life business context keeps our students up to date with developments in the business world. Role play games such as "If you worked for Facebook, how would you handle such a PR crisis to help stakeholders and shareholders trust the brand?" In class debates stretch students' knowledge and understanding of commercial laws across different countries and how major businesses address issues such as child labour and unethical dumping of waste.


Economics



AP PHYSICS AT MES CAIRO

AP Physics at MES: What is it?

At MES Cairo we offer both AP Physics I and AP Physics II to students in the Secondary American Section. I have been asked many times all sorts of questions related to these two subjects, so I have decided to share some basic information with all of you.

What are the advantages of taking AP Subjects?



Primarily, the advantage of taking AP Courses is earning college credits while at school. This means that a student who performs well in an AP Course will be able to earn credits for their bachelor's degree (depending on the university/college's policies of course) and 'skip' certain courses. For instance, if a student performs well in AP Physics I, they may 'skip' the introductory Physics Courses at university. Again, this is subject to each university's policy.

Additionally, students with AP Courses in their transcripts have stronger college applications and better opportunities to join competitive universities and colleges around the world. Furthermore, AP Courses are designed as college-level courses. This means that students that take AP Courses will be better prepared for introductory college courses. For example, students who take AP Physics I will already have a strong background in college-level Physics, making their transition from school to college a little bit easier.

Finally, AP students at MES Cairo get a 'bump' to raise their GPA for every AP course they take. This bump is granted to the student on the condition that they take the final AP examination at the end of the year, they have an attendance of 85% or higher, and they achieve a B+ or higher in the mid-year and end of year exam in the AP subject.



In the first chapter of their English A: Literature studies, our newest DP11 cohort developed their knowledge of essential literary tools used by writers, in the brief 'Elements of Literary Analysis' unit, before diving into their first text in translation 'Chronicle of a Death Foretold'.

This Columbian work was written originally in Spanish by Gabriel Garcia Márquez, who received the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1982. A departure from his better-known magical realist style, this novel consists of journalistic style narrative of a real-life murder in Columbia, in 1951.

Now following in the footsteps of the pied noirs of 20th century French controlled Algeria, DP11 have begun their study of Camus' philosophical tour de force, 'The Outsider', translated from French. Another recipient of the Nobel Prize for Literature, Camus is best remembered for his works on the philosophy of the absurd.

Also immersed in Marquez's masterpiece, DP12 took a more hands on approach, using their in-depth knowledge



of the novel's plot and characterisation to re-enact the tragic events of the novel in a Netflix worthy crime documentary. (Watch out Louis Theroux!) The creation of this tragi-comic masterpiece was instrumental in developing and consolidating our students' understanding of the plot and global issues explored in the text, and just in time for their mock oral exams!

These individual oral examinations, require the students to present their interpretation of two of their set texts, through the lens of a global issue of their choosing. The issues chosen by our students in their mocks ranged from 'the futility of the human pursuit of truth', to 'the cultivation of moral apathy'. Well done, DP12 for some truly outstanding orals!

Once finished with their mocks, DP12 will study the metaphysical poetry of John Donne, 16th Century diplomat, poet and lothario, who eventually settled into the church and penned the iconic line 'No man is an Island' (amongst many others of course!)




Group 2 News

This has involved them rating chocolate for tastiness in order to investigate how lab experiments are used in the subject. Students have also analysed a number of case studies ranging from the effects of deprivation on long-term socialisation to whether someone with severe brain damage can form new long-term memories. Their research methods knowledge has been put to good use in our first unit

of 'Cognitive Psychology'. Here, students have been learning about various different memory models and the strengths and weaknesses of each. As part of this, students have also investigated the best ways to learn and remember to ensure valuable information is not forgotten and have applied these techniques to their own learning in school. Psychology is part of our everyday lives. The applications of the subject reach far and wide. DP11 have just begun their journey into this fascinating subject and have made an excellent start in becoming promising future psychologists!

DP12 students started their new academic year applying their psychological knowledge, analytical and evaluative skills to our new unit of 'Abnormal psychology'. Debates and discussions have taken place on 'what constitutes normal?', 'when does behaviour move from dysfunctional to abnormal?' and 'what causes abnormality?'. Activities in developing empathy have also been used in order to progress our understanding on what life is like living with a mental illness. As well as this, students have been working very hard on their Internal assessments which forms 25% of their overall grade.

With all this support and perks like early access to updates and training resources means that I can continue to work with our awesome MES Cairo teachers, students and administrators and support our collective development of the use of Google within our school, and since Google is constantly updating this means there is always something new to learn.

Here in the Learning Development Department, we strive to ensure all students at MES Cairo achieve their full potential. We offer support in both extension and remediation, across the whole range of subjects offered in both the American and British Secondary sections.

This year, I have joined as Head of Learning Development for the British Section and Todd Duncan has joined as a Learning Support teacher for the American section. We both bring extensive experience in teaching students with extra support needs and are pleased to be part of the fabulous MES Cairo team. Completing the team are Mona Hanno, who heads up the American Section for LDD, alongside Mona Farag and Hanan Mansour.



When a student is being supported by LDD, we work alongside both the student and the classroom teacher to ensure that all their needs can be met effectively. We look at the way content is being presented and then take into consideration all of the students' needs and learning styles. We then use this knowledge to create extra, accessible resources- such as audio versions of texts or visual layouts of data - and ensure these resources are available for students. Other ways in which we support our students are by ensuring exam accommodations are met, spending one-on-one time with them during class times, and offering extra tuition opportunities during breaks or Homeroom - which can all happen both online, and during face-to-face teaching time. Extra help is offered for both extension and for remediation.



In this project, students will explore the idea of multiplicity, layering, and meaning through the use of a single photo. What does multiplicity mean to you? As you look around, and reflect on what you see, how might a single photo be reimagined to send a different message? How can one thing multiplied x10 make us, the viewer, see differently?

Students will begin by brainstorming ideas about pattern, repetition, and scale, keeping in mind only one photo may be used. Once an idea has been approved, students will take a single photo to be used as the foundation of their composition. They will build at least a 10-layer file in Photoshop, each layer named that includes at least one layer mask.



In order to maintain a healthy body and a healthy mind, children need good nutrition. With a hearty breakfast containing some fruit, protein and carbohydrates, our students are more ready to start their busy day at school. When at school, hydration and nutrition becomes all the more important in order to keep bodies fueled for action and brains ready to learn.



Balance and variety is crucial. Across the food groups, children need a lunchbox to sustain them that has fruits, vegetables, protein and carbohydrates. Refined sugar (biscuits, sweets, some cereal bars, some yoghurts and many fruit juices) is fine in moderation but should be an occasional treat as opposed to a daily habit.

We recommend that children get involved in packing their own lunchboxes, no matter what their age. Encourage them to choose from the following suggestions of items that work well in a packed lunch:

DAIRY	1-2 portions	Cheese, plain milk, plain yoghurt (maybe add honey)
