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School Director Foreword

Our guests were delighted by the entrance of the highly anticipated MES Cairo Flag Corps. After the flag routine, the Graduating Classes of the American, British, and IB Sections entered in a processional march to the tune of Copland's Fanfare for the Common Man, while the younger members of the MES Cairo family remained on the field in the flag corps, heralding the Graduates' arrival in a gesture of respect for the older students' achievements. The crowd remained standing for the National Anthem of the Arab Republic of Egypt, led by our Primary Choir.

After the close of the routine, Mohamed Fouda (DP12) gave a beautiful recitation from the Quran, extending a message of peace and hope.

Next, the Primary Choir performed a musical medley, much to the delight of the Graduates, their teachers and their families.

Mrs Dajani introduced to us this year's MES Cairo Graduation Guest Speaker, the esteemed Dr Hala Helmy El-Said (Minister of Planning and Economic Development); a highly prominent Egyptian figure who is a politician, a renowned economist and an academic. Dr Hala El-Said achieved her Ph.D. in Economics from the Faculty of Economics and Political Sciences, Cairo University in 1989. She has her Master's Degree in Economics with honors. In 2011, Dr Hala became the first elected Dean for the Faculty of Economics and Political Science at Cairo University.

Dr. El-Said was recognized as the Best Arab Minister by the Arab Government Excellence Award in November 2020. During her tenure, she led the implementation of the National Sustainable Development Strategy (Egypt Vision 2030) in partnership with bilateral and multilateral stakeholders, the private sector, and civil society in line with the UN Sustainable Development Strategy and the Africa 2063 Agenda. In 2021, Dr. El-Said initiated the National Structural Reform Programme and as Minister of Planning and Economic Development, she launched several projects for capacity building, gender inclusion, and youth empowerment including the Women in Leadership Positions Programme, the Leadership for Government Excellence Programme, and Rowad 2030 which aims to enable youth and support entrepreneurship and job creation.

Who better to address Egypt's leaders of the future than a champion of progress, human rights and global sustainability! "I am delighted to be here today at MES Cairo, a renowned educational institution that has been remarkably disseminating knowledge and cultivating leaders and change makers for more than thirty years. It has been advancing holistic education and offering students much beyond academic curriculum to ensure extensive opportunities for further learning, ultimately laying the foundations for









success in the adult world. As a proud mother, I witnessed how MES supported the personal development of my beloved daughter, who graduated from here ten years ago and is now thriving, along with her cousins who received an equally outstanding education at MES Cairo.

Dr Hala advised the Class of 2022 to stand up to adversity: "I always say that one should perceive difficult times as a unique chance for one to become stronger, wiser, resilient, and more disciplined...Every single one of us can passionately drive positive change in the face of negative conditions. Leadership is essentially and absolutely a choice, a choice to take initiative and run calculated risks. A choice to demonstrate acts of kindness and empathy to gain people's trust. A choice to inspire others and show them what to do by setting an example. So, when I call you leaders of tomorrow, tomorrow doesn't mean in 10 or 20 years. It literally means tomorrow. And building for tomorrow, starts today, in fact it starts now. This has been our guiding principle at the Ministry of Planning and Economic Development, as we work very hard to "Build Egypt's tomorrow, today", ensuring a better life for our citizens and a sustainable future for generations to come."



Dr Hala received rapturous applause as she closed by encouraging the Class of 2022 to "Set a vision for yourself and the world around you. I encourage you to see into the exciting future without dwelling or getting stuck in the past."

Dr Hala's speech was followed by a Secondary Choir performance of Slipping Through My Fingers (arranged by Dan Wilson). This song, about a parent watching her child grow, led to many teary eyes in our audience! During the pitch-perfect singing, the huge graduation screens showed a slideshow of our graduates "then and now"; images of each student as an infant and then as a young adult, ready to venture out into the world.





It was time for the Class of 2022 to share their thoughts with us. Represented by a student from each Section, they used the metaphor of a theatre to speak about their MES Cairo learning journey, from the opening scenes (FS1) to their current Finale on the Graduation Stage. As a school that so wholeheartedly supports the arts, our graduates acknowledged that these opportunities to present in front of varied audiences from such a young age, gave them much confidence. Their MES Cairo education has developed critical life skills helping them to "Move Forward" to the next stage. Aly Abdul Hadi (Y12), Lara Gamaledeen (G12) and Catherine Gerges (IBDP12) spoke with an arresting and impressive level of confidence, eloquence and poise, as every member of the audience listened intently, and with great pride.

We then enjoyed a musical feature sung by the MES Cairo High School Choir: 'You Raise Me Up by (Roger Emerson). This song encouraged us to think about supporting each other and making the most of our individual talents. This was followed by a stunning solo rendition of Don't Rain on My Parade (by Jule Styne), performed by our superstar graduate, Malak Mekky (Y12).

Excitement rose as Ms Ghada Dajani (Managing Director) took to the stage. This was the moment we had all been waiting for! Ms Ghada proudly announced the name of each graduate as they stood to be presented with the High School Diploma and Leaving Certificates. The IBDP Class of 2022 achieved great success in their May examinations and there was much celebration as our students met the requirements to receive their International Baccalaureate Diploma. Their overall average score of 33 points was well over the world average of 31 points and we are very proud of all of their achievements. Students from MES Cairo join thousands of others around the world who took the IB Diploma Programme this year, and over 1 million others educated by the IB since it was founded over 50 years ago.

Our top three scorers gave us even more to be proud of, delivering a set of stunning results that satisfied our high expectations of these talented, diligent and highly committed young people.

Saleem El Hady achieved the maximum 45 points out of 45, an accomplishment made by fewer than 1% of IB students around the world. **Mohammed Fouda** scored 41 points and **Malak Kandil** gained 40, placing them in the top 5% of students all over the world. That is a remarkable achievement!

ADVANGED PLAGEMENT 2381 CHOLAR STUDENTS SHINE!

Every year, students from the American Section take Advanced Placement courses at MES Cairo. All High School students have the opportunity to choose from 16 rigorous, college-level courses in English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Art and Technology. In May, students take an exam to assess their knowledge. The results are reported on a scale of 1-5 with 5 representing a student who is extremely well qualified in their knowledge of the subject.

The College Board reviews the results of all current and previous exams at the conclusion of each testing year. Outstanding students receive awards in three categories - AP Scholar, AP Scholar with Honor, AP Scholar with Distinction.

- AP Scholar Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.
- AP Scholar with Honor Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams . taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.
- AP Scholar with Distinction Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

In May 2022, 79 students from the American Section took 163 exams to assess their knowledge in 13 different subjects. 21 of these students received recognition from the College Board for their amazing AP results! Their average AP score was 3.7. Of the 21 students, MES Cairo had 11 AP Scholars, 5 AP Scholar with Honors, and 5 AP Scholar with Distinction.





Extracurricular and super curricular activities were discussed in detail as were the MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) which are available for students to complete in their own time. Many of these MOOCs are provided by some of the most prestigious institutions from around the world and allow supportive interactions between students and professors.

Students intending on applying to study Medicine attended an additional session highlighting the importance of demonstrating their passions.

Our Seniors learned how to uncover their passions, how to distinguish between the best

universities and how to be exceptional.

Unifrog, our university application platform, was put to good use as we had a live link between us and an Admissions Officer for Goldsmiths University in London. We were able to get answers to some very interesting questions including what makes an Admissions Officer want to consider an application. Students received step by step instructions on setting up their UCAS accounts and linking them to MES Cairo so that all letters of recommendation and predicted grades could be sent directly to universities in confidence.






How important has your family been in terms of your educational and extra-curricular achievements so far?



FOUNDATION STAGE TWO

Routines, Resilience and Robots



It has been wonderful to welcome the students into FS2 this term. With wide eyes and excited chatter, our FS2 children (and teachers!) have immersed themselves in our wonderful learning environment. Classrooms have been filled with amazing learning opportunities. The children love mixing with those in other classes and it has been fantastic to see their confidence and independence grow over the term.

Our main focus this year is to develop excellent routines, independence and resilience amongst our students. We encourage FS2 children to tackle new tasks, make new friends and try to complete activities differently, thinking around the problem. At the heart of this is our wonderful pod which is the hub for both learning and social development amongst the children in our year group. The activities in the pod are either based on our topic or on the interests of the children, but each activity is always based around a key skill children need to learn during FS2.

Routines are always important in FS2, and the children have enjoyed learning their new ones. Children self-register in the morning, putting their photographs into five frames to support their maths knowledge. They have a visual timetable and daily calendar to improve their understanding of time and learn the days of the week. Every morning starts with a song on a topic, maths or phonics theme. The children know they need their hats and water bottles before play and their apron on before messy activities - they are now working on remembering to do these things without an adult reminding them, to develop their independence.







In FS2, children are expected to have listen and pay attention for longer periods of time. We have more formal maths, phonics and handwriting lessons and it takes some children longer to find the focus to sit for these lessons. This is something we work on during the whole year in preparation for Year 1 where their directed lessons will be longer. The children are trying very hard to listen and participate in all the lessons and we are very

proud of the progress they are making.

Outdoor learning remains a firm focus for the students, who use it to investigate concepts and take calculated risks whilst developing their gross motor skills and resilience. Children have recently turned the benches and boxes into a very popular train, used the storage boxes on wheels to slide down an incline and made tunnels and games using the tyres in the area. The children love their outdoor learning sessions and will continue to creatively use the equipment to develop their independence.

Our Robots topic was a fantastic way to start the year. Our key question was 'I wonder if it would be better to be a robot?'. The children loved learning all about robots and their place in our world. They thought of lots of different questions they would like to find out the answers to - such as if robots have families, eat food, like swimming, or wear clothes! Over the half term we answered these questions and many more through investigation and research. A fun time was had by all!





FS2 supported Pink Day and raised a considerable amount for charity – thank you very much to all parents for contributing to this very important day. Our children spent the day in pink! They made pink necklaces, cards, hearts, bracelets, Lego buildings, foam sculptures...and the pod was also a celebration of pink. FS2 staff dressed as very life-like pink doughnuts and were nearly eaten by some children! It was a wonderful day and essential to the children's understanding of how important charity is.

Our new phonics programme 'Little Wandle' is being enjoyed by our FS2 students. They learn four sounds per week and practise reading and writing using their new sounds. They love working on their phonics during continuous provision time and we are very impressed by how wonderful their handwriting is becoming - they are showing real resilience with their letter formation.

We look forward to seeing our wonderful FS2 children continue their progress next term and I am sure we will see many more 'wow' moments!

We are WILD about learning in Year 4. Pop into our pod and you will see for yourself - our Pride Rock display (full of awards and success), a lazy leopard lounging in our reading corner and a photo mural that represents our impressive Year 4 tribe of learners.

Let's check out the learning journey in Year 4 so far - it has been a lovely start to the year and the teachers are thrilled to have such enthusiastic, eager and hardworking students.

What's the Matter?

Our Topic title this term was 'What's the Matter?' We wasted no time and got straight into learning about the three states of matter - solids, liquids and gasses. Students were able to learn and explore the concepts through experiments, research, role play and practical activities. In our final inquiry, students used their knowledge of the 3 states of matter to understand how water constantly changes state. They each chose their own way to showcase their learning and present it to the class.

History off the Page

In Topic, we learnt how heating and cooling could change the states of matter. This led nicely into the question of what we use to heat and cool and the history of these appliances. Students selected one appliance that was used for heating or cooling and completed a triorama! Our 'History off the Page' day was a fun and interactive way for students to see what the rest of the Primary School had been learning and to show pride in their work that was on display for others to enjoy.

English

We started off our English learning by looking at poems. These follow a set structure of noun, adjective and verb. Year 4 students had lots of time to revise these parts of speech and the teachers were impressed with what they could remember from Year 3. We finished this unit by writing diamante antonym poems about heating and cooling. In the second half of Term 1a, we moved onto learning about nonfiction information texts. This was a great way to integrate our Topic learning as we wrote about the water cycle, which we have really enjoyed studying. We can now identify titles, subtitles,





conjunctions and topic specific vocabulary in this genre and are able to teach our reader about the different stages of the never-ending water cycle.

Maths

The year began with students demonstrating what they had remembered from Year 3 and a lot of time was spent focusing on how to set out work in their books so that they knew the expectations. Using one digit per square, for example, will enable students to follow their calculating process and avoid any potential errors with digits being placed incorrectly in columns. We then spent time discussing how numbers up to 5 digits can be represented in different ways (Base 10, money, place value counters) and students enjoyed taking part in group projects where they could explore these possibilities. They did some fantastic display work for our working walls. Time was then spent comparing numbers to 4 digits and what digit(s) must change when adding or subtracting 10, 100 or 1000 and why. This then led to us discussing rounding, why it's important, and we explored various problems related to this. This should be a solid foundation when we look at calculating and estimating.

We are so lucky to have our wonderful Teaching and Learning Assistants in Year 4. Here are their highlights from this term:

Ms Nagham: It has been a fantastic term in Year 4 in true MES Cairo style. We were amazed with how guickly and easily our students adapted to their new classes. Over this term, everyone in Year 4

has really enjoyed reading, "The Firework Maker's Daughter". Students adapted to their he been very inspired from the discussions we had. In Maths, we used the base 10 and unifix cubes to help students understand partitioning of numbers. If you take a walk around our Pod, you will see our amazing mural wall with all the students' lovely photos. We are really proud of Year 4 students and looking forward to the rest of our learning journey.

Ms Doha: It has been a wonderful term in Year 4; students have enjoyed their learning journey through all the subjects. In Topic, they have learnt about the water cycle. Our 'water cycle in a bag' experiment was a really interesting activity for the students to explore - we represented the water cycle in a zip lock bag with food colouring and labels. Students also included all the facts they have learned about the water cycle in an information text, showing the success criteria in their writing.



Mr Madgy: In Guided Reading, Year 4 students were motivated to join a variety of stations in the Pod which have kept them engaged and busy with their learning. Each student received a table that showed them what they must do and what they can do. There were 8 exciting stations and students enjoyed completing them all. Some of the stations included: reading with the teacher or a buddy, finding a character in the book they were reading and drawing it, and creating their own fireworks.

The Year 4 Team are looking forward to Terms 2 and 3.

Year Five Students Spotlight on Respect and the 5 Rs

Respect

The common theme at MES Cairo this year is 'Respect' and Year 5 has shown great levels of enthusiasm and commitment to this concept in our PSHE lessons. Each class was allocated an area of our life where we need to show respect. In groups, students collaborated with their peers in order to represent what respect means to them. Year 5 teachers were very impressed to see many different representations of how we show respect in the form of poems, stories, freeze frames and posters.

Resilience

It has been an exciting start to the year for Year 5 Red. We spent the first few weeks at school getting to know each other and preparing for our class assembly. As part of our class assembly, we invited the first Egyptian EVER to go to space into school and meet us. She was the inspiration for our assembly and it was incredible to have the opportunity to meet her. Alongside our class assembly preparations, we have been working hard to keep up with the demanding learning schedule in all subjects. Students have already proven themselves to be resilient, reflective and resourceful.





Relationships

The shuffling of the Year 5 classes for this academic year has brought with it the opportunity to work on developing new relationships. At the beginning of term, a lot of emphasis was placed on getting to know each other and our students responded excellently to this. It is great to see the students building new friendships and speaking to each other in a polite and respectful manner. Recently, Year 5 completed a group project in English which consisted of researching a particular type of poem and presenting the information the students discovered to the rest of the class. All students were successfully able to work collaboratively to produce desirable outcomes.

Resourcefulness:

Topic has "blasted" off in Year 5 this term. We have had an alien invasion here at MES Cairo, leaving in its wake a series of clues as to what planet it came from. Part of the enquiry has been to send the alien back to its home planet. The students have studied the evidence very carefully, using this 'evidence' to determine the alien's home planet. Once students had noted their thoughts based on the 'evidence', they had the opportunity to actually design and build their very own spacecraft using recycled materials brought from home. Students got to think about the different parts of their spacecrafts, considering what the alien would need to get back home safely. The end results were fantastic! Let's just say, the spacecrafts were... out of this world!

Reflection

The start of a new term has brought about many opportunities for our students to engage in reflection. This has been especially important during our English lessons where we have been writing poetry. Reflection played an essential role in ensuring that our students included poetic features for justifiable reasons, for example, to cause excitement or to create humour. Furthermore, to enhance their poems our students used their dictionary and thesaurus skills to upgrade vocabulary which, on reflection, did not accurately capture their intended impact. Reflection is a skill that allows our students to edit, improve and learn, and is weaved throughout all aspects of our lessons. Impressively, they have shown a great ability to reflect and our Year 5 teachers are excited to see how much their learning will progress when they are applying this skill.

Risk-Taker

What an eventful Term 1 we have had. So much has happened, and as always, our MES Cairo students have shown us time and time again just how resilient they are with their risk-taking ways! We particularly stood out this term during our 'History off the page' event that we had. Each class contributed a part of their learning to create a shared rocket display that would help educate our peers about Space! We also had a chance to go see other projects made by other year groups. Each year group had "curators", which means students who would explain what their project was about. It was a wonderful way for us to share our knowledge from our Topic lessons and we had great fun!

YEAR SIX STUDENTS LEARN ALL ABOUT LIGHTS

What an incredible first term we have had in Year 6! We kicked it all off with a fun-filled day of experiments to do with our first topic: Light. Our teachers put out an array of equipment for us, including torches, mirrors, laser pens, periscopes, prisms, magnifying glasses and even a few kaleidoscopes which they made themselves. It was our job to see what we could discover using the various apparatus, and then write down some questions that we were still curious about. We observed many different things, and although the kaleidoscopes were a bit worse for wear by the end of the week, we all enjoyed ourselves.

After this, we had the opportunity to create our own experiments to answer the question 'Does light travel in a straight line?' To begin, we all made a hypothesis, which is like a scientific prediction, and then set about planning ways we could prove or disprove them. We had to think of an equipment list and a method, and some of us even drew diagrams to show what we hoped our experiments would look like. Then came the fun part, putting our plans into action. The classrooms and pod were a cacophony of lights, lasers, shadows and even some flour, but, through a variety of methods, we managed to prove that light travels in a straight line.

The next key question we wanted to answer was 'How does light help us see?' Our drawing of scientific diagrams really helped us with this, as we could







demonstrate how light reflects off of objects into our eyes and

draw arrows to show the direction which the light travelled. We began to learn about the human eye, and through some of our own research found out just how many parts there are to the eye, and the job of each one. Another mini experiment involved turning the lights on and off and seeing our classmate's pupils actually change size. If you see a Year 6 student around school, be sure to ask them why this happens!

Finally, we investigated shadows, and what better way to do this than creating our very own shadow puppet shows. As we were learning about stories with a moral in our English lessons at the time, we decided that is what we would base our puppet shows on. We used card and wooden sticks to create our puppets, cutting them out into the shape of a character (mostly animals) and then sticking them onto a handle so we could move them around for the show. Some of us retold classic stories, such as Goldilocks and the Three Bears, whilst others managed to create their own story and asked their classmates to spot what the



moral was. Either way, we all learnt that as we moved our puppets towards the light, the shadows got bigger, whereas moving them further from the torch meant they were smaller; this led to some really clever scenes.

We're already looking forward to what we have ahead of us in Year 6!

The overarching theme was about reconnecting with the student body and school community, addressing pertinent issues through the use of what she calls "comfortable discourse".

We are collaborating with classroom teachers to instruct our young scholars in how to



The following are excerpts from some of the speeches:



CREATIVE WRITING

When students see our small classroom, they raise an eyebrow, maybe two. "Creative Writing? What do you do in that class?" Offered to Grade 9 students in MES Cairo's American Section, Creative Writing develops our ability to connect and express our ideas using effective language. In other words, Creative Writing allows us to discover ourselves and our world through writing.

Our course is designed to make writing feel fun and enjoyable. We cultivate the skills and traits good writers have, such as thoughtfulness, imagination, and passion. Each lesson begins with a five-minute free-write and this activity has already helped us stop that self-doubt that keeps us from creative self-expression. It also gives us a time to reflect on our emotional and mental states, leading to much richer writing. We are already realising that the best writers are not necessarily the most talented or skilled - they are the most consistent and courageous.

Creative Writing focuses on expression in many different forms and this year we began our course by writing our life stories. It was the perfect way for us to get to know each other! Using Bill Roorbach's *Writing Life Stories* and Virginia Tufte's *Artful Syntax* as mentor texts, we observed the characteristics of the memoir genre; after some exploration, we agreed the formula is "Memoir = Memory + Autobiography + Imagination." We then reflected on meaningful and memorable events in our personal lives, using descriptions to bring our stories to life. This unit led us to sharing our deep thoughts and feelings. I am so proud of my students and their consistent courage in Creative Writing.

As the weather cooled down and we longed to be outside, we transitioned into our next unit: Nature Writing. This genre of writing is not simply about nature but also, our relationship with nature. We explored MES Cairo's outdoor surroundings. How does it feel to be outside? What do you see, hear, smell, taste and feel? We recorded our observations, but above all, we simply enjoyed experiencing a beautiful day in nature. We are currently drafting poems inspired by nature, using the examples "Freeway 280" by Lorna Dee Cervantes, "I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud" by William Wordsworth, and "Mindful" by Mary Oliver. Through our class discussions, we discovered ways in which poets convey meaning through their purposeful word choice and structure.







We might not become novelists, essayists, or poets, but Creative Writing has made us into stronger communicators and stronger thinkers, assets in any future career and leadership roles. Perhaps most importantly, Creative Writing allows us to practice empathy, a skill important in almost every aspect of life. So, to answer the questions of curious classmates, what we do in Creative Writing is we make the world a better place.

Humanities at Modern English School Cairo

How we are learning this year

The British Section Humanities Department offers students the opportunity to study Geography, History, Global Perspectives and Psychology. There has never been a more important time to study a humanities-based subject than right now. Humanities students hold the key to solving many global issues, from tackling climate change to understanding the causes and consequences of war and ensuring we learn from past mistakes. In the words of Michael Palin 'Humanities explains the past, illuminates the present and prepares us for the future. What could be more important than that?'.

Our learning journey in Humanities builds upon skills and content in KS3 and feeds through to KS4 and 5. Students are challenged to use a personalised growth mindset to push themselves beyond their comfort zone and take risks to develop their learning. Across all Key Stages, skills including communication, analysis, evaluation, independent and flexible thinking, teamwork, time management and literacy are all developed within all students.

This year the department is focusing on developing retrieval practice techniques within all our students. Studies suggest that 50% of our learning is lost within the first hour of learning it. This jumps to 75% loss after 24 hours. As a department, we are keen to ensure learning 'sticks'.


We want to show students that learning should be challenging. Nothing that is truly worth it, ever comes easy. No challenge, no change.

Retrieval practice is an evidence-based learning strategy that encourages the long-term retention of knowledge. If we regularly recall and retrieve previously learned information, then that information is more likely to 'stick' and would reduce the need for students to 'cram' before important assessments. Further research suggests that information must be recalled at least three times before it is strengthened and remembered easily.


Benefits of regular retrieval practice

Regular retrieval practice embedded into teaching and learning identifies gaps in knowledge for students and teachers. It creates a better organisation of knowledge and helps develop effective study habits for life. It helps facilitate the retrieval of information that has not been formally tested and improves the transfer of knowledge to new contexts.

How we should conduct retrieval practice in and out of the classroom




- 1. Everyone should be involved in the process
- 2. All students should be able to find out what they got right/wrong, what they know well and where they have gaps
- 3. Knowledge checking should be specified in advance- students should know what topics they will need to retrieve in advance




Numerous studies on memory show that people usually forget between 80% - 90% of what they learn in class after 30 days – and <u>the majority of</u> this forgetting occurs within the first few hours after class.

Studies on memory show that repeated exposure to information, recalling and retrieving what has been previously learnt in spaced intervals, provides the most powerful way to fix memory into the brain.









- Knowledge should be retrieved without the use of notes or any other cues. This means closing the books and thinking for yourself
- 5. Vary the methods of retrieval practice. Don't just stick to the one you know and like. We have to encourage the brain to think in different ways
- 6. Good retrieval practice should be time efficient



In Humanities, we are committed to ensuring students develop a lifelong love of learning as well as a toolkit of transferable skills to use

across subjects and beyond school. Students have been engaging in regular retrieval practice techniques throughout Term 1 so far. As stated in TESOL connections (April 2020) - 'Retrieval practice is highly supported by educational research as one of the best ways to learn'. We look forward to seeing how this helps them across their various lessons in school and within their Humanities classes.




Ms Rachel Blylevens - Primary Key Stage One

Ms Emilee Bias - Secondary Music, American Section





Selection Process for Bronze Award

applied for the limited spots. The high number of students applying comes from the various benefits the International Award carries, such as improved health and fitness, increased engagement with charitable causes and added value to students) university applications.

Practice Expedition

A range of students from Group One took part in their practice expedition for the Bronze International Award in October. Students began the first day learning about packing their kit including their tents, water and food before heading to Wadi Degla. Once there, students worked together showing good communication and









teamwork to complete the challenging 18km hike before setting up camp for the night. After a cold night of not much sleep, day two was another 18km hike.

Participants managed to complete their daily hike within 6 hours on both days. All the students were tired but very happy to have accomplished the mental and physical test unlike what they experienced before. Students experienced life beyond their familiar environment and were inspired to develop a sense of responsibility and further develop their teamwork, navigation, communication and planning skills.

I started my own business with my mother. We specialise in women's fashion. I started out by


