I have never been very good at saying 'goodbye'. I tend to wave from afar and mumble 'see you later' or 'see you soon' and walk away before anyone has had a chance to respond.

This is probably going to happen this June as I wave goodbye to Ms Nicola Singleton.

The first time Mrs Dajani and I met her was 19 years ago in the interview venue we used to meet and choose from amongst the candidates who arrived interested in working in Cairo and at MES Cairo specifically. We walked into the room and there she was, the only woman in a room filled with men in grey suits and similar ties. She spoke with such intelligence, warmth and sincerity. We were both sure she would be the right person for the job.

She joined us in the role of Deputy Headteacher, Secondary British Section, in September 2003. Her approach to leadership became instantly clear; a balance between passion and pragmatism with a sharp eye for detail. Within a few years, she was leading the Secondary British Section and then promoted to Whole School Principal and finally to School Director.





Over the years she has tackled the most difficult of issues: everything from the Secondary timetable to the turbulent times of January 2011. Change and challenge were always met with a cool logical head and an unparalleled loyalty.

Together, we initiated the IB Diploma Programme at MES Cairo, gaining authorisation in 2007. Together, and as a school, we created the IBSEA (International Baccalaureate Schools in Egypt Association). The leadership of the organisation remains with the school to this day. Ms Nicki was also an integral part and subsequent leader of the accreditation process through various Accrediting Boards over the years, steering us all to Outstanding status every time.

Her strong leadership skills were recognised and utilised by several prestigious organisations such as AoBSO (Association of British Schools Overseas) where she held the post of Executive Board Member and BSME (British Schools in the Middle East) where she held the post of Vice Chairman. This is a great honour and terrific

credit to both her as a professional and as a woman in a field often dominated by traditional placements and long-established expectations. Standing her ground and often shaking it a bit, Ms Nicki has made a lasting impression with these organisations, just as she has done over the years with MES Cairo.

After 19 years, Ms Nicki will be returning home to be with her family in New Zealand. For several months now I have been preparing myself to wave at her from afar. My consolation is that the concept of extended family is not foreign to her as a person nor in her culture. Whanau in Mãori means exactly that.

Mrs Dajani and I, as do we all, wish you Ms Nicki, health, happiness, success and fulfillment moving forward. We are all so very grateful to you and for you.

You have touched so many lives and changed them for the better. You are truly our Whanau. Haere Ran and Ka Kito Ano ...

# Cambridge Outstanding Learner Awards Ceremony

Over the years, Modern English School Cairo students have earned public recognition for their outstanding performance in IGCSE and A Levels and this year was no exception with MES Cairo students scooping up 17 Awards; more than any other school in Egypt.

Around the world over 10,000 schools in over 160 countries offer Cambridge International examinations, with 220,000 students sitting AS and A levels and 250,000 sitting IGCSEs in June 2022. All of which makes it more impressive that our students have been awarded Outstanding Learner Awards.

MES Cairo was also a recipient of a special Award at a recent Cambridge gathering for school leaders for offering the widest variety of A level subjects and entries in the 2022-23 examination series. Our broad and balanced curriculum being at the heart of our educational pathway enabling our students to access a host of university courses across the globe.

We are extremely proud of all our students who were awarded 'High achievement,' an award issued where there have been too few entries to award a 'Top in Egypt category'

'Top in Egypt', 'Top in Cairo' or 'Best Across', Outstanding Learner Award.

We look forward to seeing where our students educational pathway will take them. The Cambridge Outstanding Awards will be presented during our annual Awards Ceremony at the end of term, and we wish our students well as they continue their education or embark on their university studies.

A special shout out congratulations go to Fatima Abbady (Y12R), one of our Student Leaders, who was awarded Best across 5 AS levels and to Salma Assal (Y12G) who attained the highest mark in the world for Physical Education. Whilst not the most popular option choice in Egypt, it is popular in many schools around the globe.

We also wish Hana Amer (Class of 2022), who was awarded the highest mark in Egypt for

Psychology at A Level and is now studying Psychology at AUC every success as she continues her university studies.

## **MES Cairo's Class of 2023 Matriculates Around the World**

After thirteen years of schooling and months of completing and submitting applications for university, the Class of 2023 is making plans to take their next step after graduation. Our 156 seniors have submitted more than 1000 applications to universities in Egypt, the UK, Europe, Canada and the US. Now, as we approach graduation, they are receiving offers from their chosen universities.

#### UK

Students began working on the university applications as soon as they returned to school in September. Deadlines for university applications are as early as 12th October and continue through March. Students applying to the UK are able to submit up to five university applications through UCAS and this year 64 seniors submitted 307 applications to the UK. MES Cairo students enjoyed a very impressive 100% acceptance rate from 25 top UK universities.

#### **USA**

Many universities in the US use the Common App platform to submit applications. This year 23 Seniors applied to more than 100 Common App universities. There are a number of universities in North America that use other platforms and our students have been equally successful with them.

#### **EUROPE**

Many of our students have applied to universities around Europe, including the Netherlands, Spain, France, Germany and Hungary. The range of courses and qualifications in English from the European continent continues to grow and we enjoy significant acceptance rates for our students.

We will be reporting on final university destinations in Egypt and Overseas, in the next issue of the Messenger.

#### Celebrating Secondary Achievement



The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme is a holistic model of education, first developed in Switzerland in the late 1960s, primarily to provide consistency across schools for the children of diplomats who were constantly moving from country to country. Throughout the 1970s, the IB began to spread around the world as more and more schools recognised its value. Today, nearly 7000 schools around the world are offering the programme, which has a cross-curricular approach to teaching and learning and is strongly values-based, using a framework called the Learner Profile to encourage students to be caring, principled, and open-minded, amongst a total of ten key attributes.

Here at MES Cairo we focus on all the attributes throughout the IB journey and each month we pay extra special attention to one of the ten attributes, as we aim to fulfil the IB Mission: "to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect."

## F\$2 WORLD BOOK DAY


One such event was the 'World Book Day' that was celebrated with great enthusiasm and festive fervour in FS2. We celebrated

World Book Day with costumes galore, story readings and science-themed activities throughout the week to help promote a love of book reading and




sharing in our pupils. We had a fantastic range of outfits and even the teachers dressed up!

## KEY STAGE ONE NEWS MES CAIRO PARENTS AS PARTNERS

#### The Importance of Healthy School Lunches





Throughout the first part of Term 2, parents of KS1 and FS2 students were invited into school to take part in a workshop focusing on the importance of providing their children with a healthy school lunch each day. Parents shared their success stories and concerns with each other before listening to some scientific facts and advice relating to healthy food choices and the impact of these on mood, learning readiness and academic achievement. Tips were shared about how to plan and prepare healthy lunches.

In KS1, the parents then used the resources provided to plan a menu of lunches for the following week, alongside their child. This plan included a handy shopping list to ensure all required items were available at home. In FS2, the students worked with their parents to draw and label a healthy lunch box. By including children in the planning and making of healthy lunches, teachers see that the students are much happier to eat all the food that is in their lunch box and then return to class ready to learn. For those parents who were unable to attend, the presentation and resources have been shared on Google Classroom.

It was lovely to see the buzz in the room as parents and children worked with each other. We are looking forward to continuing this tradition next year.

#### **Developing decision making for children**

Decision making is an important skill to teach children and can be taught from an early age.

Decision making involves making thoughtful choices and finding a solution to a given situation or problem. Decision making will:

- Teach children responsibility
- Nurture creativity
- Encourage a sense of value
- Promote physical and social well-being
- Make children independent and confident

#### **How do we teach children decision making skills?**

#### **Questioning**

- Children are naturally inquisitive
- Encourage your child to ask questions about the world around them
- Answer your child's questions accurately and patiently
- Use questions that make them think

#### **Choices**

- Giving children choices develops their decision making skills
- Provide you child with choices that are age appropriate
- Consider these two questions: "Which socks do you want to wear today?" and "Do you want to wear the red socks
  or the blue socks?" The first question gives the child too many options which can be overwhelming. The second
  question is simpler, allowing the child to decide on the choice successfully



- As children grow older, you can given them more choices until they are able to make a decision based on a range of options
- Practising making good choices and taking small steps from a young age helps develop a child's reasoning skills
- A question such as "Why do you think that's the best choice?" can be helpful

#### **Exploring different ways to solving problems**

- Allow time for your child to figure things out for themselves and try not to do it for them
- Support them and offer guidance and encouragement where and when necessary
- This will require patience on your part, but it will ultimately help them learn

#### **Using games to teach decision making**

- Using games is a great way to teach children good decision making as it allows them to see the results of their decision in 'real-time', based on whether they win or lose which in turn will help them learn better
- Play simple games like naughts and crosses, musical chairs or hide and seek

#### **Learning from mistakes**

- Children will make mistakes, so it is important that you don't pressure them to make the right decision all the time
- Help your child learn from their mistakes by talking to them about what they might do differently next time
- Asking questions like, "What could you do if you find yourself in this situation again?" and "How do you think the other person might feel in that situation?" will help your child reflect on their actions and help them to learn to do things differently







Involving children in correct decision making is well worth the time and effort and is an essential part of their lifelong journey. Children, even from a young age, should be expected to demonstrate responsible behaviour and make good and wise decisions that are appropriate for their age. If children are educated about the decision making process, they will gain experience which in turn will shape them positively into the type of young person and adult they will become.

## YEAR THREE A LEARNING EXPEDITION!



Our topic of inquiry linked to Journeys during the first half term and our central question was: How do we prepare for a journey? Our students set off on an expedition around the school in the first week, using a set of clues, as well as sound relationship and resilience skills to navigate their way to the Science Room. There, they investigated and categorised an array of rocks and minerals which linked to our Science topic. Students had the opportunity to study and write about the intrepid journeys of famous explorers, and we even hosted our very own explorer in the Year 3 Pod - Miss Judy, who informed the students about how she prepared for her 100km run through the Fayoum desert. Thereafter, our students enthusiastically prepared their own backpacks filled with essential supplies that would fuel them on their future explorations.





The second half of the term brought about changes in our Topic learning as we took on the Science-related theme of Light. Our students faced the challenge of preparing investigations from beginning to end, getting to grips with concepts such as fair testing and providing accurate results. We were impressed with their teamwork skills and their ability to adopt new learning with ease and eagerness. From testing how shadows are formed to investigating the effects of UV light, the students thoroughly enjoyed their independence whilst learning valuable skills and knowledge. ## A TRIP TO REMEMBER FOR YEAR THREE WALK LIKE AN ANCIENT EGYPTIAN!

At the start of Term 2 in January, Year 3 went on a series of trips to the Pyramids. In the days leading up to the trip the children were extremely excited. There were many questions about what we might do and see whilst we were visiting. When the days arrived for each class to venture out on the trip, everyone was prepared for a day of thoughtfully planned fun and activities.

# BIOLOGY IN YEAR SIX!


We want to take this opportunity to share with you what we have been learning about in Term 2a: Mammals!

We began by trying to label the human organs inside the human body - this was a lot of fun and we made many mistakes; however these mistakes became our learning journey for the rest of the

unit. We learned all about the way our organs work together. Did you



know that our kidneys are a part of our digestive system? They act as a filter within our bodies! Our heart is a very important part of our body as it pumps the blood around to our organs. We enjoyed learning about this, as we acted out the journey of the blood: some of us acting as blood and others as organs. We also learned about deoxygenated and oxygenated blood and that they are different colours. Our arteries carry oxygenated blood to our organs and our veins carry deoxygenated blood away from our organs.



We also learned about health and fitness and the importance of keeping our heart healthy. Have you ever wondered why our heart beats so fast during exercise? Do you know if it's better to have a lower resting heart rate or a higher resting heart rate? To find out the answers, ask one of our Year 6 students. A group of staff judges voted for their favourite door. The students competed hard, as everyone wanted to win the first prize - a pizza party!
















#### ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) ART

By the time Messenger goes to print, students in AP art will have submitted their final exam portfolios for consideration by the College Board in the United States. Students spent the entire year pursuing a sustained investigation where they followed a personal line of inquiry. They were asked to identify the questions or line of inquiry that guided their investigation. What follows below are responses from three students, with names withheld for anonymity.

"Physical appearance is one of the first individual characteristics noticed by others in women and has an essential impact on social interactions, therefore, it has become a very important construct in past and contemporary societies. How can being put under pressure to fulfill this specific stereotypical image of a "perfect woman" be mentally and physically draining on women? How can you visually display this depressive state and the gradual return of confidence?

"How can I visually represent how each woman feels, show her beauty, and illustrate her accurately? How can I capture a moment of time in a drawing or painting and make it feel organic. Is there a way, to take the phrase "Through Her Eyes" in a more imaginative way? If so, then how would I do that, and what would it mean?

"How can I use different mixed media and techniques to express personal emotions within my artwork and contribute to a larger cultural conversation about mental health and wellness? What specific struggles and triumphs that stem from my own experiences can I incorporate into my art that allow the viewer to relate to or understand the artwork's concepts and meanings better? Where can you find feelings of wholeness and emptiness in everyday life and how can they be portrayed through various visual metaphors and symbols?"
































## **Mathematics Success in the British Section**

## **Hands On Biology in the British Section!**



In the last term, IGCSE Biology students were actively involved in a number of practical activities that helped them develop both their scientific skills and knowledge. The activities included performing a kidney dissection, dissecting a flower, and creating "kittens" by randomly selecting alleles for phenotypic characteristics.

The students showed exceptional performance in these practical activities, demonstrating

their ability to work independently and with precision. The kidney dissection required the students to identify and locate the different structures of the kidney, which helped them understand the functioning of the urinary system. Similarly, dissecting a flower allowed the students to explore the structure of the ovary and reproductive structures of plants, which gave them an insight into the process of pollination and fertilization.

The activity of creating kittens by randomly selecting alleles for phenotypic characteristics was an exciting and unique experience for the students. It allowed them to understand the inheritance patterns of traits and the role of genes in determining physical characteristics.

The practical activities helped the students develop various skills, including observation, analysis, and critical thinking. They also learned to work collaboratively and communicate their findings effectively. Additionally, these activities helped them improve their understanding of the biological concepts and theories they had learned in class.

Practical activities, such as those undertaken by IGCSE Biology students in the last term, are highly beneficial for their development as Scientists. #### **Extended Essay Workshop and EE Research Visit to AUC**











This term we held an exciting Workshop to introduce IBDP11 students to the International Baccalaureate Extended Essay. The Extended Essay challenges students to conduct independent research and produce an academic paper on a topic of their choosing, allowing them to explore their passions and extend their learning beyond the classroom.

The Workshop was designed to inspire and motivate students to begin thinking about their Extended Essays, providing them with a wealth of resources and guidance to get started. IBDP11 participated in a range of workshops, led by experienced teachers and our IBDP12 Senior students, that focused on various aspects of the Extended Essay process. We covered topics such as developing the research question, conducting research, writing an effective introduction, and formatting and presenting the final paper.

Throughout the day, students had the opportunity to ask questions, receive feedback, and engage in discussions with their peers and teachers. They were also provided with access to online resources and research databases, giving them the tools they need to succeed in their Extended Essay journey.

A month after the workshop the essays were well underway. IBDP11 students were invited to the AUC where they carried out more research for the Extended Essays. They were given a rare precious book room tour with AUC librarian Ms Morgan. AUC librarian Mr Muehlhaeusler directed students in finding resources in the superb university databases. This incredible opportunity for our IB students is unique to our students and it has truly complimented the research they are already undertaking in our own LMC.

The EE Workshop and AUC research visit were both very successful, with students leaving feeling inspired and confident in their ability to tackle the Extended Essay. We can't wait to see the amazing work that our students produce as they embark on this exciting challenge. We wish them well as they continue to make excellent progress with their Extended Essays in what is considered to be outstanding preparation for academic work at university. ## Theory of Knowledge (TOK) Exhibition





In March MES Cairo held a successful International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme Theory of Knowledge (TOK) Exhibition Day, where students demonstrated how three objects exemplify the manifestation of TOK in the real world.

The student exhibits focus on a prompt such as "How can we distinguish between knowledge, belief and opinion", and the three objects represent different aspects of answering that question. Each exhibit was accompanied by a written explanation that

explained how the object demonstrated key TOK concepts and terms. Students used their critical thinking and research skills to develop their exhibits, and they had to explain how each object could be used to illustrate a specific knowledge issue.

Visitors were able to walk around and engage with the exhibits, asking questions and learning about the different aspects of TOK and students and teachers from across the school came to visit the event. The assessment criteria for the exhibition were based on the presentation of the objects, the clarity of the knowledge issue being addressed, and the coherence of the explanation provided.

Overall, we are very happy with our students who have demonstrated their understanding of TOK in a creative and engaging way. The IB TOK Exhibition Day

is a powerful reminder of the value of a well-rounded education that focuses on critical thinking, creativity, and global awareness. We look forward to next year's event and the opportunity to showcase our students' learning journey once again.



## **Group 4 Project**

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme is designed to prepare students for life in a global community. One of the key components of this programme is the Group 4 Project, which requires students to work together across scientific disciplines to address a problem or a question.

At MES Cairo, students in the IBDP12 recently completed a successful Group 4 Project that focused on the concept of food. The project involved students from Biology, Chemistry and Physics, who worked together to develop innovative solutions to their chosen question. Over the course of two days, the students conducted research, designed experiments, and collaborated to develop a comprehensive answer to their food related problem. Projects included making 'dessert pizzas', testing the shapes of pasta and reconverting processed and fast food into designer food.

Their efforts paid off, and the students able to successfully answer their questions and present their findings, often accompanied by food samples of varying quality and appeal to the rest of the IBDP section here at school. The success of these projects demonstrates the power of collaboration and interdisciplinary learning. 


### Theory of Knowledge trip to




Trip 2 Saturday 11th March - Saturday 18th March

## Merci no gracias Seniors pay homage to Catalonia, November 2022

The proximity of Catalonia and its principal city, Barcelona, between the rest of Spain and the French border has made for some unique merging of cultures, as experienced by Senior MES Cairo students last November. Not least is the usage of a sprinkling of French words into the local dialect of Catalan. It was quickly appreciated that a reversion to the language of Castile may not be so welcome in these parts!

It was with this newly acquired empathy for local customs that MES Cairo Senior students began to explore the Barri Gòtic

(Gothic Quarter) on their first night in Barcelona, which culminated in a tour of its medieval streets, encompassed by ancient Roman walls. It was here that, as a visitor, one first realised the true complexity of the city's identity with a vision of hope for the future, adjacent to some of the dark revelations from the past. As brightly coloured independence flags fluttered high on balconies in the cold November air, attention was turned towards the more chilling inscriptions on the 15th century stone walls beneath. As students read them aloud, they identified the names of people, only to be informed by their guide they were reading gravestones of the victims of the infamous

Inquisition. Poor unfortunate souls, whose tombs had been desecrated and robbed for building material in one of Europe's most shameful chapters of history. The night suddenly turned blacker, but there was a sense of realisation that the pathway to a truly brighter future for Barcelona would involve transparency about the ghastliness of its past.

The following morning, our student athletes were especially excited and bouncing with anticipation as they breakfasted on churros and tortillas before departing from their centrally located hotel for probably the most popular expression of Catalan nationalism, at Camp Nou. They cherished this golden opportunity to tour the stadium of FC Barcelona, treading in the footsteps of legendary players including Messi, Maradona, Cruyff and 2022 Ballon d'Or Féminin winner Alexia Putellas. In fact, the Barça

Femení team had cemented a victory over FC Bayern Munich the previous evening in front of 47,000 spectators. Even though the Nou Camp was nowhere near capacity on our visit, there was still a sense of wonder and an even firmer sentiment that this was more than a big football club. It was the identity of Catalonia and an expression of its success on the world stage, but also of its inclusivity and reach to hundreds of millions of adoring fans, including a few Egyptian ones strolling its passageways open-mouthed! The recovery to that came in the form of a tax breaking afternoon shopping session at La Rocca Village.



In 1992 Barcelona hosted the Olympic games and although this pre-dated the births of even our oldest seniors, on the third day of their visit MES Cairo students were given a scenic bus tour of the still much appreciated facilities of the Olympic sites. They learned how this edition of the games was significant from the moment paralympian archer Antonio Rebollo lit the torch, including the return of a unified Germany and a multicultural South Africa.

It was in honour of the 'Father of Catalan Modernism', architect Antoni Gaudi, the rest of the day, (and one could say the entire visit) was dedicated to. Art students were not the only ones to be completely mesmerised and enthralled by the experience of the Park Guell with its organic configurations assimilated in harmony with the surrounding nature. This was followed with a pass-on of his House of Bones and La Pedrera (Stone Quarry), two unique world Heritage Sites.

The culmination of our appreciation of the architectural triumph in Barcelona had to be the tour of the world renowned and still under construction La Sagrada





Familia. Words cannot convey the encounter with this wondrous basilica, except to recall the look of amazement on the faces of students bathed in the natural brightly coloured illumination from Gaudi's masterpiece.

An early evening ride on Segway transporters offered a chance to reflect on such a memorable day. On reaching the harbour there was a strong connection with home as we gazed out at the Mediterranean Sea. Egypt didn't seem far away at all.

The final full day of the trip was occupied with the excitement of PortAventura, one of Europe's leading theme parks and included entry to Ferrari Land. The journey through Barcelona's incredible history and culture had finally concluded, fittingly, in such a modern setting. We are so grateful to this wonderful city for reminding us of the importance of cultural diversity, freedom of expression and of course the joy of travelling. Merci Barcelona!
