She also served as the Country Manager for the United Nations Development Fund for Women.

At MES Cairo, we take pride in the extensive Advanced Placement programme we offer to our American Section students. Advanced Placement courses are college-level courses which our students can challenge themselves by taking in high school. Last year, we reached an all-time high in number of test takers, number of exams taken, and percentage of students achieving a passing grade or higher. Furthermore, we are extremely happy to report that 29 of our students achieved AP Scholars awards at different levels.

There are several different levels of AP Scholars awards as outlined below:

Award	Minimum Number of AP Subjects	Minimum Average AP Score
AP Scholars	3	3
AP Scholars with Honors	4	3.25
AP Scholars with Distinction	5	3.5
AP International Diploma	5 in 5 different content areas	3

As shown in the table above, to be able to achieve AP Awards, students need to successfully pass at least 3 AP Courses in varying subjects. This demonstrates our students' outstanding commitment to challenging themselves to higher level courses and performing consistently across these subjects. World Class Results for our IBDP Class of 2023



IBDP Top Scorers 2023





Summer 2023 was another great moment for British Section Cambridge Exam results. After a year of challenging work our students rose to the challenge of a hectic summer exam window to achieve wonderful things and realise their undoubted potential.

In KS4, our Y10s produced some outstanding IGCSE results. As a group, Year 10 managed to achieve an incredible 77.9% A* - C with 29.3% of students achieving A*-A grades. Notable subject performance in History saw students achieved 100% A* - C with 57% of those achieving A* - A. Elsewhere, Computer Science achieved 54% A* - A.

Our high-flying achievers in KS4 include Karim Aboelsaad (Y10B) with 6A*, 1A and 1B; Aly Elakkad (Y10Y) with 6A*, 1B, and 1 C; Ahmed Kamal with 5A*, 2As and 2Cs (Y11B); Ayssel Dewidar (Y10B) with 5A*, 1A and 2Cs; Adham Bakr (Y10Y) 5A*, 2As and 1C; Omar Moustafa (Y10B) with 4A*, 3As and 1B; Aly Taha (Y10Y) with 4A*, 2As and 3Bs; Ramy Wahib (Y10Y) with 4A*, 3As and 1C; Louay Elhabiby (Y10Y) with 2A*, 6As and 1C.

In KS5, our Year 11 and Year 12 students made us immensely proud by achieving impressive results in their AS and A levels. Year 11 achieved 73% at A - C for their A levels with an incredible 29% achieving A. Emily Sigalas (Y11G), Yassin Megahed (Y11Y) and Omar Haikal (Y12G) all achieved jaw-dropping 4As.

In Year 12, this cohort achieved a fantastic 80% A* - C including 33% A*. Special mention must be made of our wonderful Student Leader, Fatima Abaddy (Y12R). Fatima achieved an unbelievable 4A* and 1A. Compare that to the fact that only 210 students took 5 or more A level examinations in England which puts Fatima Abaddy in the 0.1% achievers - Bravo!

Other notable achievers include Moustafa Elfiky (Y12B) with 3A*; Mohamed Desouki (Y12Y) with 2A* and 2As; Ziad Ibrahim Zaki (Y12Y)2A* and 1A.

A stellar performance from our KS4 and 5 students this summer and we looked forward to further success in 2024.

Our annual University Fair was held in November 2023. Hundreds of students and parents joined us through the evening to enjoy quality engagement with university Admissions Officers in attendance. Visitors were able to consult with Admissions Officers from 19 Egyptian universities as well as 8 international universities. It was a hugely successful event which was attended by students and parents from schools across Cairo. The fair is a great addition to the university and careers counselling service that is an integral part of a MES Cairo education.

Ms Levin, our University Counsellor, stated:"This event, which has grown significantly since last year, was a great opportunity for our students currently pursuing university placements to speak directly with their universities of interest about programms, requirements, and deadlines, prior to application submission. UNIVERSITY AND CAREER COUNSELLOR CORNER: A NEW ROLE AND A NEW LOOK FOR MES SECONDARY

Hello and greetings from the University and Careers Counsellor Corner! This year MES Cairo has unveiled a new position in the Secondary school: Assistant Headteacher overseeing University and Career Counselling. Our new counsellor, Ms Levin, will be working collaboratively with Principal Mrs Pfeil (American), Headtechers Ms Talbot (British) and Ms Sheehan (IBDP), as well as all the Assistant Heads and Deans from G/Y7 through G/Y/DP12 to support all of our students in the pursuit of their post-secondary options. To ensure our students receive the best guidance and support, students will have the opportunity to schedule one-on-one meetings, meet with the counsellor and their families, and receive guidance through workshops and presentations in Prime Time and after school. Ms Levin will be the point of communication for ascertaining information about application requirements, writing support, exam registration, as well as sharing insights around different university options to find the best fit for each of our students.

In our ongoing efforts to help our students meet their goals and aspirations to attend universities in the UK, the US, Canada, Europe, Australia/New Zealand, and of course here in Cairo, our students now have a single access point for support to help them build robust and stand-out applications for admission. So far this year, more than 100 one-on-one meetings with students have taken place, and many MES Cairo families have met with Ms Levin to discuss options, strategies, and get answers to questions about anything from career tracks to financing higher education.

As a first step, students in Y/G/DP11 attended presentations specifically for targets for their current year of study and tips for how to get a head start on the process to make their next year smoother. Some of the key takeaways were how students can maximise the potential of our schoolwide university and careers platform, Unifrog. This is a tool all students should be familiar with in the early stages of their university searches and it is a critical element of the application process in Y/G/DP12. In Terms 2 and 3, the work of the new counsellor will expand further and presentations and workshops for KS3, Middle School, and Y/G 9-10 will be offered.

NHS/NJHS INDUCTION CEREMONY



ON the evening of November 8th, our school's chapter of the National Honor Society and National Junior Honor Society held its induction ceremony where new members were formally introduced to the organization. The organization recognizes students who excel in four qualities – service, scholarship, character, and leadership. Applicants had to meet rigorous requirements including consistently strong grades, active leadership in and out of school, and a record of hands-on community service.

Our keynote speaker, Mrs Jennifer Rainford, was introduced by Aya El-Digair (DP12R) as a teacher



whose "teachings went beyond the chapters of our textbook. She imparted the kind of knowledge which impacts our lives in meaningful ways.

She radiated a contagious warmth when walking into the classroom and I knew that I'd laugh or smile during every one of our lessons." Ms Rainford's speech described how the obstacles she faced throughout her academic and professional career shaped her character. She left students with this inspiring message: "Perseverance, resilience and ensuring you are a good person are three aspects of character that have underpinned my life. They got me here, to where I am today. Character - who you are as a person, how you approach your journey and challenges, underpins everything else that we do."

Graduating seniors offered reflections on their experiences in the National Honor Society. The following are excerpts from some of the speeches:

Aly Gaber (G12B) discussed how his own definition of scholarship has changed throughout his high school career: "Scholarship deals with the idea of an everlasting pursuit of knowledge. It deals with dedication and discipline. Those who succeed are the ones who put themselves out the most, attempt the most challenges, and do the most difficult things they can; and they do it with constant integrity and curiosity, knowing that the key to success is constant failure with the caveat of always trying again."

Hassan EI-Nemr (G12R) reflected on how his dedication to service has shaped his character and his cultural awareness: "Inside and outside of school, I found myself taking part in various charitable activities that I would not have participated in therwise such as volunteering for the Egyptian food bank or the Workers' Iftar. These activities helped me improve my character for the better."

Khadija Awad (Y12Y) looked at the long-term results of community service: "In my perspective, service is a chain reaction that starts with the provider but doesn't just end with the receiver. It follows through, as a message of hope, that can be spread by the receiver to others to create positive change in our world."

Lina El Hilaly (DP12R) described how the programme helps promote leadership in

students: "The NHS creates leaders through giving students opportunities to gain the skills to guide their community. Giving them the freedom to make decisions, be independent and develop their resilience."



Youssef Sallam (G12R) left younger students thinking about character-defining challenges: "Character isn't just about being honest and respectful; it's about having the moral courage to do the right thing, even when it's difficult. It's about treating everyone with kindness and empathy, regardless of their background or beliefs."

Students also had the opportunity to visit the Adam Henein Museum in Harraneya on Saturday 4th November. Henein was a great sculptor of the mid-twentieth century famous for working with traditional methods and media such as papyrus, marble, and fresco. We saw the artist's entire career laid out in the museum and roamed the garden full of sculptures and interesting landscaping. Students watched an artist working on three small bronze sculptures of birds, learning how heat produces chemical reactions that affect the color of the metal. A visit to the Wissa Wassef Art Centre showed us traditional weaving techniques being practised by the women who work there. Students were amazed to learn how she plans the details of a four metre tapestry in her mind.

Exploring the World of Experimental Biology: A-Level Students' Exciting Endeavours



In AS-Level Biology this term, students embarked on an exciting curriculum filled with experimental work that nurtures their scientific curiosity and hones critical skills. Just one example of this is their undertaking of an extended investigation into catalaze enzymes from sweet potato. The students started by conducting preliminary work to find the appropriate volumes of hydrogen peroxide and sweet potato extract to enable them to collect data to calculate initial rate of an enzyme-catalyzed reaction, they then applied this to investigate the the effect of varying substrate concentration.

Practical investigations in class offer our students a hands-on opportunity to understand the intricate workings of enzymes before studying their mode of action and role in biological processes. By engaging in such practical work, students gain a deeper understanding of biological concepts and cultivate valuable skills that are applicable to the Advanced Practical Skills exam and also transferable to various academic and professional domains. These experiences lay a strong foundation for further scientific exploration and future careers in the sciences.





MES CAIRO AND SANDY SPRING MARYLAND (USA) AP ENGLISH STUDENTS EXCHANGE IDEAS

"What do you think of when you think about home?"

This question asked Ms Sharpless and Ms Reynolds's AP English Language scholars to reflect upon their memories, the place, and the people that embody "home." MES Cairo AP Language students each shared an image of the family, pets, and landscapes that make them feel a sense of belonging.





They were not the only students asked that same question.

Donté Tates and Rebecca Sachs, AP Language educators at Sandy Spring Friends School in Maryland, USA, asked their scholars the same question! The four AP Language educators then created a Padlet gallery wall and randomly assigned each student to rhetorically "read" another student's photo from across the Atlantic, analyzing the transcendent values we associate with home and belonging.

In addition to this Padlet exchange, our AP students read Toni Morrison's "Home," a

short convocation speech that explores how one defines home and foreignness in conflict. Then, during an in-school field trip, students met synchronously online and engaged in some small-group and large-group conversations about the personal importance of home, visual/verbal rhetoric, and the politicsed nature of hospitality and belonging.

This exchange is one of AP Language's exploration of rhetoric, argumentation, and conflict transformation in the real-world. Emily Reynolds and Donté Tates's collaboration originated through Middlebury College's Bread Loaf Teacher Network & BLSE's Teaching, Acting, and Writing for Change Fellowship, two collectives for educators committed to sharing practice, scholarship, community, and activism. However, this exchange would have been impossible without the support of MES Cairo's supportive administrative team, and the brilliant AP Language students in both schools. We are eager for more engagements that bridge together our shared humanity.

YEAR 1 NEWS



It is an exciting time for students entering Year 1, as this pivotal year marks a significant step in their educational journey at MES Cairo. Year 1 is the first year of the UK national curriculum and sets the stage for a year filled with growth, learning, academic achievement and memorable moments. In Term 1A we focus on friendships, personal relationships and transition from FS2 to Year 1. We place great emphasis on a smooth transition between year groups, in particular when year groups are shuffled. Throughout the year we plan a range of activities and opportunities to ensure that the students feel happy, secure and familiar with the Year 1 environment. These transition sessions have paid off as each student has settled well into their new classes. Everyone is making new friends and we are always amazed by how



quickly the students form a tight knit class. Getting to know each student individually is a top priority in Term 1, as is creating a warm and welcoming environment for each child. We encourage every child to share their experiences at school, helping them

to articulate their thoughts and feelings about new friendships. PSHE lessons are held throughout the week as we recognise the importance of social and emotional development. It is important for the students to understand and articulate their feelings and emotions in a positive manner as well as learning about respect, empathy and self-awareness.



Year 1 is a critical time for building foundational skills in English and Maths. Reading and writing

activities will take center stage, with a focus on Phonics. You can help your child at home by ensuring that you hear your child read daily and by asking them comprehension questions. In Year 1 we focus on fluency and prosody and therefore they should be able to read their home reading books with ease. To foster a positive learning environment we encourage the students to develop a sense of independence and resilience. Teachers will guide students in understanding classroom routines and expectations. We are also encouraging the students to take care of their belongings, manage their time effectively and increase their listening and concentration skills.

Young children learn best when they are able to learn actively. In Year 1 we follow a play-based curriculum, which means the students learn through hands-on experiences,

creative projects and interactive lessons that engage their imagination and natural curiosity. To support this, ask your child open-ended questions about their day to encourage them to share what they have learned and discovered.

We have many exciting experiences planned for the year ahead including our first trip to Horseville. We look forward to spending a memorable year with your child and are excited to see all that they can achieve.



TO INFINITY AND BEYOND! YEAR 5 NEWS

In English this term, we have been learning about both poetry and non-chronological reports. Within our poetry lessons, we learned about how the use of figurative language, such as similes and metaphors, can help the reader understand what the poem is about. We also had opportunities to perform poems to each other as well as our rainbow class in Year 1, who thoroughly enjoyed our visit. In the second half



of the term, we had lots of opportunities to research information on various planets and organise this into sub-headings which would then form a non-chronological report. We used editing skills to ensure our final written reports included fantastic sentence



openers, technical vocabulary and clear content that we could share with other classes in Year 5.

In Maths this term, we have focused on Place Value and the Four Operations. We challenged ourselves by rounding numbers all the way up to one million and being able to write the numbers in both digits and words. We wanted to inspire younger students to love maths so we collaborated respectfully in our groups to create colourful eye-catching posters to help younger students understand some of the more tricky concepts in Place Value.

Our first learning inquiry in topic lessons this year allowed the children to journey to the stars and consider how humans might one day travel to Mars. As part of this learning, the children were introduced to our solar system and the celestial bodies that can be found in it. The children considered the materials that each planet is made of; their relative sizes and orbits and what the

environment is like on each of them. We also learned about how the Sun lies at the centre of the Solar System and the heliocentric model of the planets' orbits. The children also learned about the Earth's position in the solar system, why there is day and night and why we have seasons. We also discussed why there is life on Earth, and why life has yet to be discovered on other planets. We then moved on to considering what life in space might be like and how people might travel to other planets. We also thought about what challenges people might face living on other planets. To summarise our learning, the children planned their own mission to Mars. They needed to consider all of the ideas that they had previously learned in the unit to come up with their own plan as to how they might travel to and make a new home on Mars.

We have been learning about the features of poetry, how figurative language helps to build strong imagery and the authorial intent behind it all. We then practised identifying and writing our own examples of similes, metaphors, alliteration and onomatopoeia before applying them to our very own poems. We then shared these with Year 1 in our very own 'Poetry Slam' and paired up with Year 2 to share our reading books. Part of the guided reading focus for this term was also developing our knowledge and skills of prefixes, suffixes and root words.

In PSHE, our focus has been on RESPECT. We have discussed and shared ideas about what respect looks like and how we show respect to others and ourselves. Not everyone will always be respectful so as a class, we have also discussed strategies in how we respond to hurtful behaviour. We've also discussed what discrimination means, how we recognise it and ways in which we can challenge it. We have regular opportunities to reflect on our own interactions within our community and document our thoughts and feelings.

EXTREME EARTH IN YEAR 6!



Year 6 has been having a great time learning about how extreme our Earth can be. They've been learning about the following

natural disasters: earthquakes, volcanoes, tsunamis and tornadoes. Did you know that Earth's tectonic plates are a major cause of natural disasters? Each week, they have been strengthening their map skills using their Atlases, researching areas where natural disasters are likely to happen, and placing them on a world map. Year 6 discovered a geographical area known as the Ring of Fire. Ask any Year 6 student what they have learned about the Ring of Fire! Each class has been adding their learning to their class Floorbooks.

Many students completed absolutely fantastic Home Learning projects at home. They had the choice to complete two out of six options and showcase them to the class. We saw some amazing volcanoes that erupted before our eyes in our classrooms! We also saw some creative ways to display a tornado, complete with houses and animals collected up by the strong winds. Some students chose to complete a video as a news reporter, reporting about a natural disaster that had happened. Presentation skills are important as our students make their way into secondary education, so some students chose to create presentations to educate the rest of us about the

In addition to this, Students have applied their learning and knowledge to their creative English writing where they wrote tragedy





stories involving their chosen natural disasters! They explored rubble and dust left from natural disasters and found some precious lost items within it. These items became their inspiration for the character they created for their story. Some items included: jewellery, a fishing net, a telescope and a compass.

Many students created fantastic stories. Ask a student what their story was about and what their favourite part of their story was!

LIBRARIES AT MES CAIRO

KS2

The KS2 Library is for the children from Year 3 to Year 6. The KS2 Library contains age appropriate titles for the children to enjoy

at home. This year the library is encouraging children to find the right book for them, this is not always an easy task! To encourage the children to pick a book they perhaps would not normally pick, the reading levels within the Library are no longer being used. Having the opportunity to select a book to take home to read for pleasure, should be a fun activity. The children already have guided reading within their classes, so a library book is a book that they may never get the opportunity to read normally.

At the beginning of the school year, all of the KS2 children were encouraged to take any book they would like from the Library, as long as they tried to use the new 'Five Finger Rule'. This is a tip for all readers all the way up to our Seniors. Here is how it works; take any book that you think you might like, open the book on any page and read from top to bottom. For each word you come across that you do not know, put one finger up. If you only have one finger up at the end of the page, then perhaps the book is too easy, two to three fingers and the book should be just right. If you have four fingers up, the book will be a challenge, but you should try the book. If you have five fingers, then the book is too hard FOR NOW! Come back to the book in a few months time when your reading has improved and the book that you may have found too hard then, could well be your book now.

The children have embraced this and the variety of books being taken from the library is certainly impressive, although the choices of some of our younger students can be quite ambitious so we ask that perhaps a parent or older sibling help them out a bit!

The KS2 library was also very lucky to receive many new books over the summer break. New books keep appearing on the shelves as the busy librarians add them to our collection, book by book.

As well as new books, we also have a new Librarian and Library Assistant. We are very excited to be in the KS2 Library this year. A great deal of work was carried out over the summer to make the Library a welcoming environment for our students. We are also keen to see how the children begin to make their choices when faced with the entire library to choose from. It is really very interesting for me to see what books and subjects interest the children. We plan to guide them effectively and help them find 'their book' this year and and to nurture a love of reading in all students.



MES CAIRO SENIOR MENTOR PROGRAMME REIMAGINED AND REFOCUSED FOR 2023-2024

On 12 September 2023, a week before returning to school for their Senior Year, our 2023-24 Senior Mentors met at MES Cairo for their Welcome and Induction Day. Students were welcomed to a lively and enthusiastic environment where they had a chance to reconnect with various faculty and staff and catch up with their friends after the summer holiday. The day officially began with the introduction of the new Mentor Programme Coordinator, Ms Levin and the Mentor Supervisors, Mr Magdy (Peer Mentors), Ms Quarles (Academic Mentors), Ms El-Kassaby (Student Mentors), and Mr Kerins (Athletic Mentors).

The Induction Day offered the chance for the Mentors to get a clear understanding of the purpose and direction of the programme for the upcoming year, as responsibilities and expectations were outlined. With a large and energetic group, the chance to get excited and ready to start the school year strong was the perfect way to kick off the many Senior events and activities at MES Cairo this year. Students participated in team building and reflective exercises in which they had a chance to consider how they



can show up as the best and most authentic version of themselves, setting goals for themselves as well as for the programme.



The Senior Mentor Programme is a significant commitment that these students make to contribute positively to the school culture and community. Choosing to be a mentor is not something that should be taken lightly and students know that there will be sacrifices including giving up breaktime, and free time for the program.

The programme also requires that students take full responsibility of their time management and workload management, as the responsibilities of a mentor do not stop for exams and extracurricular activities.

The MES Cairo Senior Mentor Programme is open to any rising Senior to apply to, and there are four unique service opportunities within it. Students can apply to be one of the four unique types of mentors based on their personal preferences and skillsets. This year our mentors have an amazing opportunity to build their skills in a variety of areas as they learn and practise strategies to support students in KS3 and G7/8. Mentors are given training from their supervisors and participate in ASAs to review, reflect, and improve. The mentor

supervisors offer tools and techniques to ensure the mentors are able to provide their mentees with guidance, coaching, and an empathetic ear for those challenging times we all face some times. The different mentor roles include the following:

- Student Mentors who support students in their transition to Middle School and teachers in YG7 & 8 Homerooms and Break

- Athletic Mentors who support the Cougar Programme through active involvement in sports ASAs and teams and also support schoolwide sports related events

- Peer Counselling Mentors who will be trained in techniques to help them grow their self-awareness and psychological flexibility to become more resilient and mindful; these techniques will be used to support their peers with everyday life issues



- Academic Mentors who support students in specific academic classes as a way to ensure the students are maximising their learning time within it, Under the guidance of Dr Magdy, our new MES Cairo Counsellor, our Peer Mentors are learning how they can move through the world in a way that supports their mental health and personal development so that they are also able to impart these skills to younger students. Dr Magdy explained, "Our peer wellness programme aims to promote the mental health and wellbeing of students. The mentors work with the younger students towards helping reduce their stress, as well as improving their social and emotional skills, such as communication, empathy, resilience, problem-solving, and self regulation." Self-regulation is a key to being able to manage stress and frustration and using their ACT matrices, the Peer Mentors are showing impressive growth. The goal of their training is to improve their psychological flexibility to help them and other students be more resilient and mindful.

Working diligently with Ms Quarles, our Academic Mentors have completely changed how this role is seen at MES Cairo. In spite of working with the logistical challenges of

multiple timetables depending on sections and availability, our Academic Mentors have had a tremendous impact this term. Ms Quarles spoke to the success of the Academic Mentors this year saying, "The Seniors have a special quality about them that we teachers just don't have... it's the 'Cool Factor.' The Senior Mentors are able to inspire the younger students to take an interest in their schoolwork in a way that adults cannot. They make maths fun. They make science interesting. Younger students see Seniors taking their academics seriously, and they suddenly want to do the same. The impact of our Academic Mentors is unmatched. They're a valuable addition to any teacher's classroom."



YEAR AND GRADE 8 TRIP TO KINGSWOOD, ASHFORD, UK.


Our UK Trip focused on offering our students adventure and a variety of high adrenaline experiences building resilience, confidence and life skills and memories.

72 students and 8 staff set off from Cairo to Grosvenor House, a facility for Inspiring Learning, set in the grounds of a former manor house in Kent. Initially our students were taken out of their comfort zone, making their beds before settling down for the night, eating in a canteen setting and ending the evening with a sports extravaganza in the impressive onsite gymnasium.

The use of the outdoors was a vehicle where learning and personal development enhanced students' social, entrepreneurial, and problem-solving skills. The Laser tagging and the Blind Obstacle Course required excellent communication skills, conveying







the information appropriately and in ways that can be understood. Students enjoyed competing against each other in archery, learning the importance of focus and precision. Bush craft skills activities required students build shelters in the wood and attempt to set a campfire alight, a tricky task with only a rudimentary flint and survival skills. Students also enjoyed the autumnal woodland colours and the local squirrel population as they foraged for acorns before winter sets in.



The highlight for many students and staff were the Zip Lines and the 3G Drop, this required teamwork, strength and courage as students dropped from high before hurtling down the zipline in tandem, accompanied by a few screams and whoops of delight.

After a few days of exhilarating outdoor activities, we headed to London to visit several museums, taking in the London sights en-route. Splitting into two groups, students visited The Natural History Museum which offered our students the opportunity to walk beneath the largest animal on earth, the amazing 25.6-meter Blue Whale suspended in the air in the magnificent Hintze Hall. Students also experienced the 1995 Kobe earthquake as they stood in a supermarket simulator as they walked through the Earthquake and Volcanoes gallery. Our students were also enthralled in the Science Museum in the Transportation wing, culminating in the awe-inspiring Space Gallery and the Interactive Human Body Exhibition. After a hectic day, students looked forward to a short visit to West Shopping Mall before heading back to Kent ready to pack for the flight home.
